History – story telling, lessons learned

April was Care Experienced History Month, marked formally for the first time in Australia, with 30 April being a Day of Remembrance. Information can be found here: Care Experienced History Month – Find & Connect (findandconnectwrblog.info).

Remembrance ceremonies, reunions, marking anniversaries etc can be important for people who were in care or other institutional settings as children. It can provide an anchor for people to reconnect with those with whom they spent time as children. It can also be a painful reminder of the absence of family, removal from community, and, sometimes, of abuse and neglect experienced in care.

The telling of stories and never forgetting the past is important for survivors of abuse, institutions and communities, especially in the context of redress where lessons learned are a vital input to shape current safety practice.

Each year, the UCA marks the anniversary of the National Apology to survivors of institutional abuse (22 October). Your Synod or institution may wish to note, participate in and promote awareness of local remembrance occasions.
